*CF is the most common, fatal, genetic disease affecting young Canadians. It attacks the lungs and the digestive system. The CCFF is a Canada-wide health charity, with more than 50 volunteer chapters, which funds cystic fibrosis research and care. The Foundation is a world leader in the fight against CF. The gene responsible for CF was identified in 1989 by a Canadian-led team of researchers supported by the Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Canadian investigators continue to play a leading role in the worldwide race to find a cure or control for the disease. When the CCFF was established in 1960, most children with CF did not live long enough to attend kindergarten; today half of all Canadians with CF may be expected to live into their late 30s, and beyond.*
